THE GOLDEN RULE OF MENTORING

"Do to others whatever you would like them to do to you. This is the essence of all that is taught in this law and prophets." Matthew 7:12 (NLT)

We often think about this verse in terms of being nice to others because we want them to treat us nicely, but I wonder sometimes if there aren't other qualities we should consider as well. Do I think this way when I deal with people in other settings?

How about mentoring others? Throughout my coaching career, I had guys on the team making multimillion-dollar salaries. Anyone with the slightest interest in sports knows those professional players' salaries have skyrocketed in the past few years. So, what do you think the response would be if players were asked to teach and "coach" other players in their particular positions for the overall good of the team?

Believe it or not, that's what happens on good teams. Veteran players help the younger players improve because it will help the team grow stronger. Defensive backs could show new defensive backs the techniques that took them years to learn. The end result? Sometimes the new guy eventually beats the veteran out of a position and the lucrative salary that comes with it.

How about honesty? How about helping someone see where they need to improve by being candid and forthright about it—rather than sugarcoating it or worse, not pointing it out at all? Sometimes hearing no is painful, but we can pick ourselves up and move on much easier than if it were maybe. Sometimes getting a poor job review can give us the opportunity to work with what we have and learn. If we believe everyone was created by God with specific gifts and abilities—like no one else-then we have to believe they are equipped to do incredible things in some setting, some place. Maybe right now they are just in the wrong place.

What about helping someone grow in his or her faith? If you didn't know about Jesus Christ or had not asked Him to be our Lord and Savior, and someone we know did know Him, wouldn't we want that person to tell us about Him? Amen.

OF FRACTIONS AND FULLNESS

"We cared so much for you that we were pleased to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own lives."

1 Thessalonians 2:8 (CSB)

Multiplication is a mathematical operation that generally results in putting numbers together to make them bigger. We think of multiplication in terms of growth. Three apples times five children equal fifteen apples altogether. Larger outcomes. Expanding products. But when you multiply any whole number by a fraction, an inverse result takes place. The answer is actually smaller than the whole number in the equation. Combining fractions into a multiplication problem away from its value, rather than contributing more to it.

And despite what people say, how we never use the things we learn in school in real life, certain math principles do come with applications that convert into everyday experience.

We see it taking place in the life of Paul. His ministry to the church at Thessalonica didn't last long, apparently only a few weeks (Acts 17:2). Yet even his brief stay caused enough of an uproar that his Christian brothers had to hustle him and his ministry companion Silas out of town under cover of darkness (v. 10) to avoid being caught up in the riot. But in that thin space of time, Paul gave himself completely to task—expanding, increasing and multiplying their growth. He not only "reasoned with them from Scriptures" (v. 2), teaching them sound doctrine of the faith, but he did what he always did in every place where he ministered. He dove into those relationships with both feet, putting himself at their full disposal, loving and investing in them without any reservation. Not in fractions, withholding portions for later. But wholly and fully. Whatever it cost. Whatever they needed.

He was all in. One hundred percent committed to the task. To the people. To his friends. This investment yielded a bountiful harvest in the life of the church.

"Having so fond an affection for you," he wrote to them later, "we were well-pleased to impart to you not only the gospel of God but also our own lives"—their own lives —"because you had become very dear to us. For you recall, brethren, our labor and hardship, how working night and day so as not to be a burden to any of you, we proclaimed to you the gospel of God" (1 Thess. 2:8-9). He spent those few weeks there "exhorting and encouraging and imploring" them, the way "a father would his own children" (v.11), totally focused on helping them "walk in manner worthy of God who calls you into His own kingdom and glory" (v. 12).

Expansion. Multiplication. Growth. For the glory of God.

What kind of friend, spouse, son, daughter, employee, and team member are you? Are you the type who brings your wholehearted determination and investment into these various relationships? Or do you hold back, only devoting a fractional half effort into the mix, not really making yourself available and vulnerable and invested in growing the people around you?

Here's to being whole-number people, the kinds of women and men who encourage fuller, deeper, healthier, more bountiful results in every relationship and encounter and effort that is entrusted to us. May we cause vast multiplication—expanding, joy, peace and the power of our God—everywhere we go. AMEN.

TEEN'S CORNER

A SLAVE OF JESUS

"Simon Peter, a servant and apostle of Jesus Christ to those who through the righteousness of our God and Savior Jesus Christ have received a faith as precious as ours: Grace and peace be yours in abundance through the knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord."

2 Peter 1:1-2 (NIV)

When Peter began writing his second letter, he didn't introduce himself by saying, "Peter, a best friend of Jesus, present at the Mount of Transfiguration, featured preacher on the day of Pentecost." Instead, he simply wrote, "Simon Peter, a servant"—or, translated more accurately, "a slave." John, Timothy, and Jude all give themselves the same title. James didn't begin his letter by saying, "James the half-brother of the Son of God." He began by saying, "James, a slave of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ" (James 1:1 NLT). When Paul wrote to the church in Rome, he began by identifying himself as "a slave of Christ Jesus" (Rom. 1:1 NLT).

Most of us grew up in homes where we were taught to study hard in school so we could get a good job and make lots of money and live in a big house, drive a nice car, and enjoy great vacations. When you ask a child what they want to be when they grow up, the answer generally reflects that influence. No kid ever says, "When I grow up, I want to be a slave," In fact, most of us would find the idea of slavery offensive because of what occurred in past history. But that is what the Bible calls us to. The Bible teaches that the highest calling for you and for me is to be a slave to Jesus.

Sure, there are other ways we identify with Christ. He is a friend of sinners, a master teacher, and the head of his church. He is the promised Messiah, a conquering King, and the omnipotent God. We are lost sheep, and he is the Good Shepherd; we are sinners, and he is our Savior. But when we call Jesus "Lord" we aren't saying any of those things. We are saying, "He's the master, and I am the slave."

In fact, we can't call Jesus "Lord" without declaring that we are his slaves. The two terms are inseparable. As crazy as it might seem to everyone else, as ridiculous as it might appear to those who don't understand, we *choose* this life of slavery. Nobody will ever be forced into slavery to Jesus. Out of love, we willingly submit to his lordship.

When we fully surrender all that we have and all that we are to him, we discover the strangest thing: It's only by becoming a slave to Jesus that we can truly find freedom. AMEN.

What are the master's responsibilities to the slave? As you pray today, submit yourself again as a slave of Jesus, and thank him for being a perfect loving master. AMEN.



Disability Etiquette 101

People with disabilities are individuals with families, jobs, hobbies, likes and dislikes, and problems and joys. While the disability is an integral part of who they are, it alone does not define them. Don't make them into disability heroes or victims. Treat them as individuals.

The Basics

Ask before you help. Just because someone has a disability, don't assume he/she needs help. If the setting is accessible, people with disabilities can usually get around fine. Adults with disabilities want to be treated as independent people. Offer assistance only if the person appears to need it. A person with a disability will oftentimes communicate when he or she needs help. And if the person does want help, ask how before you act. Be sensitive about physical contact.

Some people with disabilities depend on their arms for balance. Grabbing them, even if your intention is to assist, could knock them off balance. Avoid patting a person on the head or touching his wheelchair, scooter or cane. Always speak directly to the person with a disability, not to his companion, aide or sign language interpreter. Making small talk with a person who has a disability is great; just talk to him as you would with anyone else. Respect his privacy. If you ask about his disability, he may feel like you are treating him as a disability, not as a human being. However, many people with disabilities are comfortable with questions about their disability with people they know. A simple "I don't feel comfortable sharing that" by the person with a disability can set the tone if it is not something that he/she is willing to share. Don't make assumptions.

People with disabilities are the best judge of what they can or cannot do. Respond graciously to requests. When people who have disabilities ask for an accommodation, it is not a complaint. It shows they feel comfortable enough in your establishment to ask for what they need. And if they get a positive response, they will probably come back again and tell their friends about it.

People With Hidden Disabilities

Not all disabilities are apparent. A person may make a request or act in a way that seems strange to you. That request or behavior may be disability-related. For example, you may give seemingly simple verbal directions to someone, but the person asks you to write the information down. He may have a learning disability that makes written communication easier for him. Or a person may ask to sit, rather than stand, in line. This person may be fatigued from a condition such as cancer, or may be feeling the effects of medication. Even

though these disabilities are hidden, they are real. Please respect the person's needs and requests whenever possible.

People with Psychiatric Disabilities or Mental Illness

- Stress can affect the person's ability to function. Try to keep the pressure of the situation to a minimum.
- People who have psychiatric disabilities have varying personalities and different ways of coping with their disability. Some may have trouble picking up on social cues; others may be supersensitive. One person may be very high energy, while someone else may appear sluggish. Treat each person as an individual. Ask what will make him most comfortable and respect his needs to the maximum extent possible.
- In a crisis, stay calm and be supportive as you would with anyone. Ask how you can help, and find out if there is a support person who can be sent for. If appropriate, you might ask if the person has medication that he needs to take.

People With Developmental Disabilities

- Speak to the person in clear sentences, using simple words and concrete—rather than abstract—concepts. Help him/her understand a complex idea by breaking it down into smaller parts.
- Don't use baby talk or talk down to people who have developmental disabilities. Gauge the pace, complexity, and vocabulary of your speech according to theirs.
- Remember that the person is an adult and, unless you are informed otherwise, and can make their own decisions.
- People with developmental disabilities may be anxious to please. Sometimes, the person may tell you what they think you want to hear. Questions should be phrased in a neutral way to elicit accurate information. Verify responses by repeating each question in a different way.
- It can be difficult for people with developmental disabilities to make quick decisions. Be patient and allow the person to take their time.
- Clear signage with pictograms can help a person who has developmental disabilities to find their way around a facility.
- People with developmental disabilities often rely on routine and on the familiar to manage daily living. Be aware that a change in the environment or in a routine may require some attention and a period of adjustment.

Intellectual Disabilities

- Greet the person normally with age appropriate language. Don't baby talk.
- Repeat information about yourself if necessary.
- Rephrase, rather than repeat, sentences that the person doesn't understand.
- Treat people equally.
- Even if the person doesn't read, offer reading materials.
- Don't force conversation.
- Don't argue. Wait for rational moments.
- Ask how you can help, find out if there is a support person who can be sent for.
- Ask what will make him/her most comfortable and respect his/her needs to the maximum extent possible.
- Remember that these behaviors are just as stressful for parents and family members. Engage family in conversations related to best strategies and natural supports at a time and manor that conveys empathy and understanding.

If a person uses a wheelchair...

- Do not push, lean on, or hold onto a person's wheelchair unless the person asks you to. The wheelchair is part of his/her personal space.
- Offer to tell where accessible seating areas and rest rooms are located.
- When giving directions to a person in a wheelchair, consider distance and physical obstacles (curbs, doors, stairs, etc.).

If a person is deaf or uses hearing aids...

- Let the person take the lead in establishing the communication mode, such as lip-reading, sign language, or writing notes.
- Talk directly to the person, even when a sign language interpreter is present.
- If the person lip-reads face him or her directly; speak clearly and at a moderate speed.

If a person has a disability that affects speech...

- Pay attention, be patient, and wait for the person to complete a word or thought. Do not finish it for the person.
- If you do not understand, ask the person to repeat what is said. Tell the person what you heard and see if it is close to what she/he is saying.
- Be prepared for various devices or techniques used to enhance or augment speech. Don't be afraid to communicate with someone who uses pen and paper, an alphabet board or a computer that speaks.

If a person is blind or has a disability that seriously affects vision...

- Don't leave the person without excusing yourself first.
- When asked to guide someone with a sight disability, never push or pull the person. Allow him or her to take your arm, and then walk slightly ahead.
- Be specific when describing the location of objects.
- Don't pet or distract a guide dog. The dog is always working. It is not a pet.

Other Hospitality Tips

• **Parking spaces.** People who do not have disabled parking tags or license plates **should not** use parking places designated for people with disabilities.

The Vote Was Unanimous

Bob Leverenz couldn't figure out what all the fuss was about. As president and board chairman of Leverenz Shoe

Company in southeastern Wisconsin, he was just proud that his employees were willing to help out the world-famous Allen-Edmonds Show Company when their factory burned to the ground. Allen-Edmonds lost everything in a multimillion-dollar fire: fifty thousand pairs of men's dress shoes, sales records, files and machinery.

After a planning session with his management personnel, Bob took to a vote with the union workers in their New Holstein plant on the idea of sharing their own Leverenz factory space with Allen-Edmonds workers, which would condense their work week into four ten-hour days. This would free up the factory for the Allen-Edmonds people to use their location to make their shoes on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

When the union vote was taken, every hand in the place shot up. The members of the local United Food and Commercial Workers Union voted unanimously to share their factory space and machines with their competitors. That's when the media descended upon the Leverenz Shoe Company for interviews. Radio and TV news broadcasters had lots of questions. Bob received congratulatory letters from people all over the country, but quite honestly he couldn't understand what the fuss was all about. To his mind, it was simple. Someone was in trouble and they were able to help.

One of the interviewers from CBS asked Bob, "How is it that if Macy's burned down, other department stores would rejoice in the added business it would bring their way? How could you be so different? How could you help someone who is competing with you for the consumer's shoe dollar? How could you actually let them come into your factory, and use your machines and equipment to make their shoes?"

Bob told the interviewer that the answers to those questions began in 1970 when he attended a layman's leadership institute in Miami. After three days of talks by prominent business, political and sports figures, Leighton Ford, Vice President of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, challenged the participants. "I don't have any idea of the depth of your commitment to the Lord. Perhaps you want to renew your commitment or make one for the first time."

At that moment Bob knew that everything he'd been doing for God, the church and his community had actually been done to elevate himself in the eyes of his friends, family, coworkers and fellow citizens. Suddenly he knew he'd just been going through the motions of being a Christian. At home Bob paged through his Bible and found a verse in Romans: "Then what can we boast about doing, to earn our salvation? Nothing at all. Why? Because our acquittal is not based on our good deeds, it is based on what Christ has done and our faith in him. So it is that we are saved by faith in Christ and not by the good things we do." (Romans 3:27-28)

That was it! All his life, Bob had been headed in the right direction, knowing that God was real. He chugged along, teaching another Sunday School class, raising a little more money for various organizations and thinking he was a Christian. But when he read that verse in Romans he understood that all those actions and good deeds must be the outgrowth of his faith, rather than a substitute for it. His interest in people—their hurts, needs and wants—intensified. At last he was trying to minister because of his allegiance to God and not because it was a good thing to do, because it was expected of him, or because it made him look good.

Soon after Bob had a chance to put his new commitment to work at the Leverenz Shoe Company. Because of the major recession in this country in 1974, it was questionable whether he could continue to operate their New Holstein plant. Division in the ranks, jealousies, high emotion and back-biting among employees were destroying them. Bob had never seen these attitudes in the company before.

One day at the factory he shut off the main switch, called all the workers together and asked them to pray with him. In that tiny town of New Holstein, Wisconsin, 150 workers and Bob prayed their way out of the doldrums of low morale. Bob spoke aloud. "Lord, remind me how much I depend on my fellow workers to make my job go smoothly. Help me to remember that without the person next to me, my job would have no meaning. Lord, help us work together and respect each other."

No one can ever tell Bob Leverenz that prayers aren't answered. The transformation in that factory was miraculous. After they prayed together the people in New Holstein started helping each other in a constructive way. They corrected things done by previous operators on machines that were detracting from a quality product. Attitudes changed. Now the emphasis was on making a better pair of shoes instead of climbing over the next person to get ahead.

One other time Bob brought his workers together to pray. In November 1983 they were faced with the grim fact that two-thirds of the shoe companies in this country had gone out of business because of the influx of imported shoes. They desperately wanted to keep their company together, but to do this; they'd have to lay off thirty percent of the people from the New Holstein and Valders factories.

But something just wasn't sitting right. Bob wondered, Are we really supposed to take this drastic measure? He thought about the verse from Romans and wondered if this is what Christ would have done. Did he have the right to put 30 percent of his employees out of work? Instead of ending the meeting and moving ahead with the plan, Bob asked his management committee to pray with him about the decision. The discussion that followed brought about a solid feeling that they would scrap the factory reorganization and cutback plan, and talk to the workers instead.

That afternoon they visited both plants, New Holstein and Valders. They explained how dismal the prospects were for the future. Then Bob asked all the employees to pray with him. After the prayer, the discussion that followed brought out all sorts of money-saving suggestions.

Just two months later, in January 1984, business started to zoom. Salesmen brought in orders from new customers. Previous customers reordered in huge quantities. By mid-March, sales figures were forty to fifty present higher than they'd been the previous year. In many respects business was the best it had been in ten years.

During this wave of success came the Allen-Edmond's fire. Some say that could have been the frosting on the cake for the Leverenz Shoe Company. With Allen-Edmonds, one of the leaders in high-quality men's dress shoes, out of business even temporarily, the Leverenz shoes could have seen even greater sales. But that's just not the way the folks at the Leverenz Shoe Company did things anymore. Bob admits that when the Allen-Edmonds people moved into their plant on weekends he wondered if they'd misuse the machines, if they'd know how to lubricate them, if they'd leave messes that his employees would have to clean up. Would their special equipment get in the way of the Leverenz machines?

He needn't have worried. Two Leverenz employees offered to come in that first weekend on their own time to help adjust the machinery to meet Allen-Edmonds' needs and to help their workers place their raw materials in a convenient location.

Then workers from both companies started leaving notes for each other, little greetings, words of appreciation. On Valentine's Day the Allen-Edmonds people left a jar of candy and a cute card for the Leverenz people. The second week one of the Leverenz workers left them a note, "You don't have to take all those packages of laces home with you each weekend. Leave them here. I've cleared off a shelf for you." Heartwarming relationships developed among the workers of the two shoe companies...workers who never met each other face to face.

When Bod said he couldn't figure out what all the fuss was about when the media descended upon their little factory after the fire, it's because what they did came so naturally. Bob believes that his union workers in New Holstein probably read that verse in Romans even before he did.

It's a simple story, really. Everyone at the Leverenz Shoe Company believed that helping each other is what true faith in God is all about. And when you're really working for the Lord, you can't do anything less than help out a competitor when the opportunity arises. Just ask the folks at the factory in New Holstein. They voted on it unanimously.


LORD, TEACH US HOW TO PRAY!

"I'm the spiritual life chairman of my circle," one said, "but all the president lets me to do is close in prayer."



Another remarked, "My president lets me pray for the food, and that's it." They went on and on. Evidently they didn't know what I was talking about. That's when I silently cried out to the Lord for help.

"You know," I began, "I want to tell you something about your pastor's wife. I never teach a Sunday School class, never lead neighborhood Bible study, never speak anywhere without calling on my two strong prayer partners. The three of us pray earnestly that God will enable me to speak." Not you," they said. "Not our pastor's wife. You don't have any needs."

"Your pastor's wife needs prayer," I insisted, "she knows very well that she can fall flat on her face if there isn't prayer support." Over time and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, I had at last convinced these eight women that their pastor's wife depended 100 percent on prayer when she went out to minister for Christ.

Slowly, they began to pray: "Oh, Lord, show me." "Lord, cleanse me." "Lord, use me." That was all they prayed that first time, but it was a beginning.
