

I LOVE TO TELL THE STORY

"God has not given us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power, love, and self-discipline. So never be ashamed to tell others about our Lord."

2 Timothy 1:7-8 (NLT)

These verses describe my dear friend Donnie Shell perfectly.

We were teammates during the two years I played for the Pittsburgh Steelers. Donnie was named to the Pro Bowl five times and won four Super Bowls during an NFL career that spanned fourteen seasons. But the first thing I noticed about him was not his athletic ability; it was his Christian lifestyle.

That's the thing Donnie is most proud of in his life: his relationship with Jesus Christ.

And he's quick to tell you about that relationship. He won't hammer you with it, but he is always ready to share the importance of it in his life. You can see his relationship with Christ in his manner, in his talk, in the way he treats and engages people, and in the decisions he makes in his family life as well as in business. Donnie lives out the idea of "power, love, and self-discipline," and "never being ashamed" of the gospel. Donnie always has Jesus on his heart and wants to talk about Him to anyone he meets.

How about us? When it comes to telling others about Jesus, you and I should follow Donnie's lead, always ready to share what Jesus Christ has done in our lives. There may have been times in the past when we tried but were hesitant. And that has intimidated us, so we haven't attempted it since. Maybe we're timid to share because we don't know how it will be received. Maybe we feel inadequate to share – after all, we haven't memorized the entire Bible yet.

Here's the bottom line: God, through what Jesus Christ did for you, changed your life forever. You are not today who you were before God changed your life, and you are becoming more of the person He wants you to be each day. Share *your* story – don't worry about knowing all the Scripture verses or about teaching the Bible to someone. Just share *your* story. If you want just one verse to use, use John 3:16 – "For God loved the world so much that he gave his one and only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life." Amen.

DESPERATE ENCOUNTERS

"You will seek the Lord your God, and you will find Him if you search for Him with all your heart and all your soul." Deuteronomy 4:29 (NASB)

Word circulated that Jesus would be passing through Jericho one day, and a diminutive tax collector named Zacchaeus wanted to catch a glimpse of Him. Desperate, the man climbed a tree so he wouldn't miss what his heart was hoping to behold. Jesus saw him there, perched in the tree, and called to him as He passed by: "Zacchaeus, hurry and come down, for today I must stay at your house." (Luke 19:5)

Bartimaeus, an outcast and blind man, was also passionate about "seeing" Jesus. Sitting at his usual begging post, he heard the commotion of people excitedly streaming into town hoping to get a look at the stranger who was said to be the Messiah. When Bartimaeus heard that it was Jesus passing by, he cried out, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" (Luke 18:38) – loud enough that he embarrassed the other townspeople, who wanted to give Jesus a dignified welcome. But his persistence caught the ear of the traveling Savior, and a blind beggar received his sight.

In the Old Testament, when God tested the Israelite travelers, threatening to abandon them in the desert after their worship of a golden calf, it was the desperation of Moses pleading with Him – "If Your presence does not go with us, do not lead us up from here." (Exodus 33:15) – that galvanized God's continued presence among the people. Moses didn't want the Promised Land without the Promise Giver. And in response to His servant's desperation, God said, "I will do this very thing you have asked, for you have found favor with me, and I know you by name" (v. 17 CSB). He dazzled Moses with His glory in the cleft of the rock – with more of His visible presence than anyone had ever seen.

Perhaps what we lack more than anything else these days is what these three people had: Holy desperation.

Clearly, God responds to it. **He wants our relationship with Him to be our consuming passion** – what we think about, what we talk about, what we're constantly hungry for more of and willing to do anything for – because **He knows** once we've experienced His manifest presence; our appetites will be whetted for more. And more.

Those in the Scripture who didn't let obstacles become excuses for not seeking Him, or back down at others' disapproval of their unabashed appeals for mercy, or give in to the despair of delay but latched on to Him for dear life – they received what God was obviously willing to give them. **Wonder what He is ready to give** *you* if only you will seek Him **more desperately**? **More passionately**? **More fully**? Amen.

LEAVE YOUR BIBLES OPEN

"Man does not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of the Lord." Deuteronomy 8:3 (NLT)

Daily Bible reading is a habit worth developing. The Word feeds us spiritually and satisfies our thirst for peace. It convicts us of sin and reminds us of God's grace. Still, the Bible will not jump into your hands or demand your attention. Chances are nobody will be checking up on whether you spent time in the Scriptures today. Yet few things could possibly be more important.

According to the American Bible Society, more than half of the population would like to read the Bible more often, but only 15% of Americans do it daily. Southerners and the elderly do it the best. (So, if you're an elderly Southerner, you get a free pass to skip to the next devotion.)

Most of us would cite the same reason for not spending daily time in our Bibles: "I'm just too busy." But ARE we? I don't mean to get too nosy, but how much time did you spend on Facebook or Pinterest today? How often did you check your Instagram feed or scan the latest Groupon deals? How long did you park yourself in front of your TV or gaming console? We find plenty of time to scan today's news headlines or devour our newest novel. Yet we ignore the very words – the only words – that have the power of life.

What you feed yourself is what you start to develop an appetite for. God's Word will appeal to you more and more as you learn to turn away from competing interests. In other words, you may have to subtract something in order to add Bible reading to your day. But you'll find the trade to be well worth it.

PURSUING TODAY

To help develop a new habit, plan to **read your Bible** (even for a few minutes) at the same time and in the same location every day. **Leave your Bible open or set an alarm to remind you**. Try it for the remainder of this twenty-five-day section. **If you have some extra time, read Psalm 119**, an entire psalm devoted to the power of God's Word. Notice all the different names for God's Word – laws, statutes, etc. Then **make note** of all the benefits of spending time in it. Amen.

Family Emergency Scams

Scammers may pose as relatives or friends, calling or sending messages to urge you to wire money immediately. They'll say they need cash to help with an emergency — like getting out of jail, paying a hospital bill, or needing to leave a foreign country. Their goal is to trick you into sending money before you realize it's a scam.



Verify an Emergency

If someone calls or sends a message claiming to be a family member or a friend desperate for money:

- Resist the urge to act immediately, no matter how dramatic the story is.
- *Verify the person's identity* by asking questions that a stranger couldn't possibly answer.
- Call a phone number for your family member or friend that you know to be genuine.
- Check the story out with someone else in your family or circle of friends, even if you've been told to keep it a secret.
- **Don't wire money** or send a check or money order by overnight delivery or courier.
- *Report possible fraud* at ftc.gov/complaint or by calling 1-877-382-4357.

Scammers Use Tricks

They impersonate your loved one convincingly.

It's surprisingly easy for a scam artist to impersonate someone. Social networking sites make it easier than ever to sleuth out personal and family information. Scammers also could hack into the e-mail account of someone you know. To make their story seem legitimate, they may involve another crook who claims to be an authority figure, like a lawyer or police officer.

They play on your emotions.

Scammers are banking on your love and concern to outweigh your skepticism. In one version of this scam, con artists impersonate grandchildren in distress to trick concerned grandparents into sending money. Sometimes, this is called a "Grandparent Scam."

They swear you to secrecy.

Con artists may insist that you keep their request for money confidential – to keep you from checking out their story and identifying them as imposters. Victims of this scam often don't realize they've been tricked

until days later, when they speak to their actual family member or friend who knows nothing about the "emergency." By then, the money they sent can't be recovered.

They insist that you wire money right away.

Scammers pressure people into <u>wiring money</u> because it's like sending cash – once it's gone, you can't trace it or get it back. Imposters encourage using money transfer services so they can get your money before you realize you've been scammed.

Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

Who wouldn't want to win thousands or even millions of dollars, or the chance to go on a luxury vacation? There are many legitimate sweepstakes and contests out there, and the idea of winning some fabulous prize can be mighty alluring. Con artists get that, and they exploit your eagerness to score that big check or dream trip. Sweepstakes and lottery scams have been around for a long time, and they're still going strong.

According to the FTC, the initial contact in a sweepstakes scam is often a call, a postcard, an email or a social media notification offering congratulations for winning some big contest. But there's a catch: You'll be asked to pay a fee, taxes or customs duties to claim your prize. The scammers may request bank account information, urge you to send money via a wire transfer, or suggest you purchase gift cards and give them the card numbers.

Regardless of the method, once scammers ensuare a victim they keep asking for more money and provide nothing in return but more promises. To protect yourself, follow these basic precautions.

Warning Signs

- Calls or online solicitations that claim you were automatically entered in a sweepstakes you've never heard of before.
- A person calls you and says he has a winning state lottery ticket but needs help paying an upfront fee
 to collect on it. According to the North American Association of State and Provincial Lotteries,
 "Once a ticket is bought, no money is EVER required to claim a prize."

Do's

- Do look carefully at the envelopes of purported sweepstakes mailers. If your entry form or congratulations letter was sent bulk rate, it means a lot of other people got the same mailing.
- Do watch out for scammers who try to trick victims into thinking they've won a legitimate contest, such as the Publishers Clearing House (PCH) sweepstakes.
- Do read the fine print on the contest form, and make sure it isn't missing legally required information such as the start and end dates of the contest, the methods of entry, descriptions of prizes and various legal disclaimers. If that stuff isn't there, something is funny.
- Do carefully check for your odds of winning, and be especially leery of contests that don't disclose it.
- Do beware your own eagerness. An *FTC survey* found that those who reported a high willingness to take risks were three times more likely to become victims of fraudulent prize promotions than those with a low willingness.

Don'ts

- Don't ever pay a fee to claim a prize you've supposedly won or to improve your chances of winning.
- Don't wire money to or share gift card numbers with someone claiming to represent a contest or lottery. "Both payment methods are a sure sign of a scam," the FTC warns.
- Don't deposit supposed winnings that come in the form of a partial-payment check, accompanied by instructions to return a portion to the contest sponsors. The check will bounce, and you'll likely have to repay your bank for any withdrawals from that deposit, including what you sent the scammers.
- Don't believe people who contact you via social media about a cash prize, especially if they purport to be Mark Zuckerberg the *New York Times* recently reported on con artists who promise big money in the online guise of the Facebook chief executive.
- Don't call a number with an 876, 809 or 284 area code to confirm that you've won a prize. Though they aren't identified on your phone as foreign, those codes belong to Caribbean countries that have become hotbeds for contest frauds. They might be masking "pay-per-call" services (the equivalent of 900 numbers in the United States) that enable the number's owner to charge a hefty per-minute fee which you won't discover until you get your next phone bill.

A Story to Warm Your Heart

ALWAYS BELIEVE IN MIRACLES

"Where there is great love there are always miracles."

The year was 1924, and it was a few days before Christmas. Outside, a blinding snowstorm raged around the typical city row house into which my family had moved from the country only two months earlier. We hadn't yet become acquainted with any of our new neighbors.

I didn't see the snowflakes making frosty designs on my window, nor was I aware of my mother's lonely vigil by my bedside. I was a little girl of five, deep in a feverish coma, and had the only case of the dreaded diphtheria in Philadelphia.



Two weeks earlier, my illness had been diagnosed by the neighborhood's family doctor, whose office was a well-worn room in the basement of his home at the corner of the block. Immediately, my father and older sister had been given shots of antitoxin and shipped off to relatives until the danger passed. My mother, refusing to trust her child to a strange hospital in a strange city, stayed behind to nurse me at home.

The city posted yellow warning signs on our front and back doors announcing a contagious disease. To make doubly sure no one other than the doctor approached, a policeman stood guard, twenty-four hours a day, outside each door. It was also their duty to see that my mother remained inside. Mail was laid on the doorstep, and the officer would tap on the door, then move back some distance to see that my mother opened the door only a crack and quickly took the mail inside.

In those days, Christmas shopping didn't begin in October, nor were toys given in the abundance popular today. A week or so before was time enough to prepare, and the tree was to be decorated by Santa Claus when he came on Christmas Eve. This year, in my family, it was different. With the sudden onset of diphtheria, no thought had been given to Christmas. My getting well was all that mattered.

Late in the afternoon of December twenty-third, the policeman tapped on the door. There was a letter on the stoop from my mother's sister. She was Catholic, and she'd enclosed a small bag of medals with her letter: "I can't be with you," she wrote, "but I want to help. My priest has blessed these medals. The bag is never to be opened, just pin it on your little girl's nightgown and believe."

My mother, willing to try anything, pinned the medals to my gown, but with little hope, as she looked down at my drawn cheeks and proceeded to apply cold compresses to my forehead. My eyes remained closed. During his visit, the doctor's face was grave, and he only shook his head sadly before taking his leave.

Late the next afternoon, my mother heard a faint call. Rushing into my room, she burst into tears of joy. The fever had broken and my eyes were open! Uncomprehending but overcome with gratitude, she fell to her knees and hugged me, but her relief was suddenly shattered when my first words were, "Mama, it's Christmas Eve. What is Santa going to bring me?"

"No, no!" she cried. "Honey, you've been sick a long time, but it isn't Christmas Eve yet." But try as she might, she could not persuade me to think otherwise, and I fell asleep that night with sugarplums dancing in my head.

Downstairs, my mother was frantic. She told me years later how she even considered putting on some of my father's clothing and trying to sneak out to the corner store to get me a few toys, but of course she didn't. Come morning, all she could do was hope to convince me that Christmas was yet to arrive.

Christmas morning came, and I awoke with the usual childish anticipation. My mother, exhausted with heartache, was still half-asleep when the policeman gave his familiar tap on the door. Wearily, my mother opened it, and then gasped in surprise. On the doorstep was a large country basket filled with a Christmas dinner for two and an assortment of toys for a five-year-old girl. My mother's eyes silently questioned the policeman, but he only smiled and shrugged his shoulders. There was no answer there. Where had this spirit of Christmas come from? Would she ever know?

I recovered fully, unaware that two miracles had occurred that Christmas. My father and sister returned, and we settled into life in the city. As the years passed, my mother made a lasting friendship with one neighbor in particular, a friendly Irish woman and busy mother of six. Although they were close friends for years, it was only much later that my mother finally discovered the secret of the second Christmas miracle. Her friend with the thick, Irish brogue and smiling eyes—at the time a complete stranger—was the one who had understood, as a mother, the awful predicament my mother faced and cared enough to leave that wonderful Christmas basket on our doorstep. Thanks to her, I still believe in miracles. With God, all things are still possible!

As I child, I surmised that they were just good stories but now as a mother and grandmother I realize she had an ulterior motive - she was teaching me a most valuable lesson - a lesson about kindness and thankfulness.

She often added to the story of the Good Samaritan, "You never pass someone in need even if their skin is not the color of yours." And, "You should never pick and choose who you will be kind to, you just be kind," she would enumerate over and over.

This same instruction came with Manners and Etiquette. "Know what to do and do it. If you do the same right thing often enough it will become second nature to you." "That way," she would instruct, "You will always know what to do and feel confident doing it." Sounded complicated as a child but as I grew older I realized what I did automatically, others my age struggled with.

This tutoring soon gave me the understanding that the Kindness lessons and the Manners lessons were synonymous. They both really were practicing the Golden Rule. Which is simply put, "Treat others, as you want to be treated and never forget any kindness extended to you."

I also learned as a child growing up that my mother always had a slip of paper fastened to the inside of a cabinet door in the kitchen. It was near the sink where mother was more apt to see it. At the top of the page were written the words, "Lest I forget." There was never a kindness extended to her or our family that was not found listed on her paper. In November of each year she would in some way once again let the person or persons involved know how grateful she was for their kindness. Mother often quoted the reminder to us, "Don't remember the kindness you do for another, but never forget kindness done for you."

I am reminded even more of the lessons learned as a child and even some days I find myself missing that spot on grandma's lap and the peace that came with her loving arms around me.

May we each give thanks and remember all kindness given to us.

A Few years ago, right before Thanksgiving, I was dumped without warning by the man I thought I would marry. The next day, I was laid off from my administrative assistant job and the day after that I turned forty.

I'd lived in New York City for ten years trying to make it, as an actress. While I'd had some luck on stage, nothing had paid enough for me to make a living at it. I was single, broke and approaching middle age in a profession that worships youth and beauty.

The last thing I wanted was to go home to Florida for Thanksgiving and catch up with my younger, married and successful cousins. At least we would all meet at Brooks, my favorite restaurant back home and a family holiday tradition for twenty years.

The day before I flew to Florida, I got a terrible cold. I was lying in bed feeling very sorry for myself when the phone rang. It was my mother.

"Darling," she said. "I have wonderful news!" This made me cringe. Her last report of wonderful news was she had married a man she met online two weeks before. Now, recently divorced for the fourth time and living in a new apartment complex for "active elders," I feared the worst.

"What is it?" I sniffled. "Well..." she replied, pausing for dramatic effect, "you know how every year we have dinner at Brooks. This year, I've decided to make dinner for the family myself. Well, with your help, of course. Let's see, we should have... twenty-five people, not including us. Won't that be so much fun?"

Could I have pretended she had the wrong number? Yes, if I hadn't been so stoned on cold medicine and thinking clearly. Instead I mumbled "Yeah... great... can't wait" and hung up, pulling the covers over my head before passing out.

The next day, I arrived at the Ft. Lauderdale airport looking and feeling absolutely miserable. I picked up my luggage from baggage claim and walked outside to look for my mother. A platinum blonde pulled up to the curb beside me and honked the horn. "Do you like it?" my mother exclaimed. She leaned out of the car window to toss her formerly salt-and pepper- curls, now flat-ironed and reaching her shoulders.

"Who are you and why did you steal my mother's car?" I replied. She laughed like a girl of sixteen. "Silly! This is to celebrate my wonderful new life!" "Oh- Wonderful," I said. I should have been happy for her, but at that point my mom looked and sounded ten years younger than me. The next day was madness. I shopped and cooked more by noon than I had in years. At midnight, I was bent over the sink, elbow-deep in a still-frozen turkey, trying to pull out the gizzards with both hands.

Even though the activity helped take my mind off my troubles, I still felt sad about my life and worried about what I would do when I got back to New York.

Thanksgiving Day, we woke up at 6:00 a.m. to finish cooking. I never thought we would pull it off, but somehow, we managed to prepare everything, clean the house, fit four card tables next to the dining room table in a one-bedroom apartment, polish the silverware, find matching plates and even create four miniature pumpkin centerpieces.

We put out our casseroles and hot dishes on the buffet, checked the turkey, and just had time to change clothes before the first guests arrived. Soon the house was overrun with family. No one asked about my boyfriend or if I had gotten any acting work lately. They all just oohed and ahhed over the table. They couldn't believe we did it all ourselves.

Before we ate, we said grace and went around the table to say what we were thankful for. I've always loved doing this each year but now, even though I was proud of helping my mom and glad to see everyone, I didn't really feel like contributing.

Mother's turn came before mine. She said, "I am thankful for my health, my family and my friends. I am especially thankful to my daughter Alyssa who taught me the meaning of gratitude on a Thanksgiving thirty-nine years ago."

I looked up from my plate. What did she mean by that? She continued. "Alyssa's father Ed had just gotten out of the Army. I was a new wife and mother of a one-year-old. We left Ft. Polk in Louisiana for Pittsburgh because that's where Ed found work. Well, the Army lost all our furniture in the move and we had no money to buy more. We also couldn't afford to go home for Thanksgiving.

I went out and bought one baby food jar of strained turkey and one of strained carrots for Alyssa and two turkey sandwiches for us. We sat on the floor in our empty apartment and cried over our misfortune. Then we heard Alyssa laughing."

My mother looked over at me with tears in her eyes. "You were so happy. You were singing and having such a good time playing with your food in that cold empty apartment. I pray that you will always find happiness in every living moment, my darling daughter."

I was stunned. I had asked myself how a woman of sixty-five who lived alone on a fixed income decided to become a hot blonde and make Thanksgiving dinner for almost thirty people.

Now I had my answer She was just following the example I had set so long ago and had forgotten. When I returned to New York, I had a new sense of purpose and thankfulness for life. I also went blond.

Bible Study Series . . .

WATERING DOWN THE BIBLE



Dr. David Jeremiah Turning Point

ave you ever tasted something that has obviously been watered down? Even the finest coffee or tea loses some of its flavor when it is diluted with too much water. A watered down message can lose its potency as well. In the world today, there is an attempt by some to water down the Word of God in an attempt to make it more palatable to the changing morals and attitudes of our culture. But the Bible doesn't conform its message to public opinion polls. It doesn't change its doctrines in response to societal consensus. It should never be watered down.

God's Word is eternal—ever old, ever new, and ever sure. The Bible is as venerable as, "Thus says the Lord," and as contemporary as, "The Last Days." It spans the ages, being ageless. We can count on it in every condition: in sickness, in health, in poverty's vale, or abounding in wealth. In a world of lies, His Word is truth. In a world of opinions, His Word is accurate down to the last jot and tittle.

Because God is eternal, His Word is established in the heavens. Because He cannot fail, His Word cannot be broken. Because He is unchanging, His Word is certain. Heaven and earth may pass away, but the Scripture will endure forever.

The Inspiration of Scripture

The word "inspiration" is taken from 2 Timothy 3:16, where the apostle Paul said, "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God. . ." Peter gave additional insight when he wrote, "No prophecy of Scripture is of any private interpretation [or origination], for prophecy never came by the will of man, but holy men of God spoke as they were moved by the Holy Spirit" (2 Peter 1:20-21).

Inspiration can be defined as the power of the Holy Spirit upon the human writers of the Scripture so that as they spoke and wrote the books of the Bible, they were recording the very words God intended to give the human race. I've never understood pastors who stood in the pulpit without a firm belief in inspiration. **Why would anyone devote his life to preaching a Book he didn't believe?** Arthur W. Pink said, "Upon the foundation of the Divine inspiration of the Bible stands or falls the entire edifice of Christian truth."

The Inerrancy and Infallibility of Scripture

The doctrine of inspiration leads logically to the tenets of inerrancy and infallibility. If holy men of old spoke and wrote as they were borne along by the Holy Spirit, those words must be trustworthy in all respects. The word "inerrancy" means that the Bible is without error in its original manuscripts. The word "infallibility" means that it is accurate, unfailing, and authoritative. It's possible to accumulate a lot of information and store up a lot of data. But only the Bible provides an infallible foundation for true knowledge.

Bible Study Series continued

The Indestructibility of Scripture

The Bible is also indestructible. Reuben Archer Torrey, who was a champion of the Bible in an age of encroaching liberalism, thundered: "It is so self-evident as to be practically axiomatic that what man has produced man can destroy. If then men produced the Bible why have eighteen (now twenty) centuries of assault upon the Bible been unable to destroy it?"

Torrey went on to say that the Bible has been attacked by many people of great ability and power, using all the intellectual, scientific, philosophical, political, and physical forces they could command. Emperors tried to burn it. Scholars tried to discredit it. Critics tried to bury it. The world has tried to ignore it. But it's still the best-selling book of all time. While human governments have fallen, while human philosophies have faltered, the Bible still stands.

The Influence of Scripture

If the Bible is the inspired, infallible, inerrant, and indestructible Word of Almighty God, it should have a lasting influence on our lives. When our Creator and Redeemer tells us something, that word is determinative. If it's a command, we must obey it. If it's a truth, we must accept it. If it's a promise, we must believe it. Otherwise we are double-minded people, unstable in all our ways (James 1:8). A watered down message leads to a waterlogged life.

Let's cherish our Bible. Read to be wise. Obey it to be safe. Believe it to be happy. Proclaim it to be joyful.

How We Got our Bible

- 1. God used about forty men in writing the Bible. Some of these writers are unknown, such as the writers of the last chapter of Deuteronomy, the book of Job, and some of the psalms. In round numbers, the time in which the forty worked included about 1500 years, from 1400 B.C to A.D. 100.
- 2. The perfect harmony of these writings is convincing evidence that all of them were guided by a single mind—the mind of God. Some of the writers simply wrote down what God had told them, as when Moses wrote the law (Deuteronomy 31:24). Some of them no doubt recorded what they had learned from others, as when Luke wrote about the birth of Jesus, probably repeating what Mary had told him. Some of them may have used earlier writings, as when the writer of 2 Samuel 1:18 referred to the book of Jasher, a book that had been lost. But all the writers were specially guided by the Spirit of God so that they wrote just what God wanted them to write.
- 3. Any passage of Scripture is to be studied with the following questions in mind:

Who is speaking?

To whom is he speaking?

Is the passage intended to others in addition to those to whom it was first given?

Is the passage intended to apply to a limited time or under specific circumstances, or is it of universal applications?

When answered correctly, we are less likely to misunderstand the message of God's Word.
